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Course Objective

Macroeconomics is the most interesting and core part of economics. This course is an intermediate level of macroeconomics. We explore the short-run [business cycle] and the long-run [growth] behavior of the economy. The course presents recent macroeconomic theories and models based on microeconomic principles. Applications to current and historical economic problems are emphasized. By the end of the course, students should be able to apply the material to understand current discussions about the national economy. The course presents a solid ground in modern theoretical macroeconomics with a “Theory Confronts Data” approach. The course is designed to prepare the student to undertake advanced macroeconomics, pursue graduate studies and/or to become a policy analyst. The approach is even-handed and not biased toward a particular school of thought. The focus is on the market-clearing approach, but with a more central treatment of Keynesian analysis.

To solve the problems, basic knowledge of calculus and algebra are required. Students are responsible for *all* materials covered in class that is presented in the textbook, in the study guide and in the lecture notes.

Attendance at lectures is not mandatory but is recommended. **If you are experiencing any difficulty in this class (or any other), please arrange a meeting with me to discuss it.**
